#### 1.0 Verification of Quorum

#### 2.0 Call to Order and Welcome

Committee Chair Robert G. Stern called the meeting to order at 2:29 p.m. EDT.

#### 3.0 Review and Approval of Minutes

Committee Chair Stern asked for a motion to approve the minutes of the March 16, 2017 meeting, which was made by Trustee Johnson, and a second, which was made by Trustee Rosenberg. The Committee Chair asked for discussion, and then for all in favor and any opposed and the motion was approved unanimously.

#### 5.0 Discussion/Informational Items

#### 5.1 Legislative Update

Jane Adams, Vice President for University Relations, discussed the results of the 2017 legislative session and indicated that a special session had convened. Committee members were briefed on University of Florida budget items, as well as on substantive legislation considered by the legislature. Adams provided an analysis of the vetoes and how UF compared to the other state universities.

Jack Payne, Senior Vice President for Agriculture and Natural Resources, discussed how vetoes impacted six items related to IFAS (Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences).

Ed Jimenez, Chief Executive Officer, UF Health Shands, reviewed the hospital financial and regulatory issues related to the legislative session.

#### 5.2 Annual Report on Communications

Assistant Vice President, UF Communications, Nicole Yucht, shared the end-of-the year report highlighting 2016-17 strategic communications initiatives and demonstrating how they elevated the national image and reputation of UF. Committee members saw the results of the Gator Good campaign, in addition to the top national media stories and the most engaging social media activities from the past year.

Ms. Yucht noted that the major UF brands including athletics, UF Health, UF IFAS, Advancement and the colleges, speak with one voice to leverage the University's accomplishments and deliver the most impactful message for all audiences.

Public service announcements (PSAs) ran during televised athletic events and resulted in more than 43 million impressions. The national exposure of the PSAs, along with the targeted efforts of the ad campaign, translated into clicks on the GatorGood.com website and three-fold increase in time spent on site from last year. The ad value for these spots during football season was \$270K.

Emphasizing UF's social media efforts, Ms. Yucht noted there were more than 1.2 million likes and follows as of mid-May. The most recent survey of higher education social media engagement ranks UF at No. 7. She also reported that there are several new projects underway, including the launch of a media experts' database and an institution-wide event calendar.

#### 5.3 Annual Report on UF Compass: Student Information Systems

Vice Presidents Elias Eldayrie and Zina Evans provided the annual report on the implementation of UF new Student Information System, COMPASS (Campus-wide Modernization Program to Advance Student Services). COMPASS unifies student services systems and will be

implemented over several years based on the student life cycle. Dr. Evans and Mr. Eldayrie provided an update on improvements to the admissions decision release, which have resulted in an overwhelmingly positive experience for applicants and their families.

#### 6.0 New Business

There was no new business.

#### 7.0 Adjourn

After asking for any further discussion and hearing none, Committee Chair Stern asked for a motion to adjourn, which was made by Trustee Rosenberg, and, with no further discussion desired, the motion was passed unanimously and the University of Florida Committee on External Relations meeting was adjourned at 3:39 p.m. EDT.

Committee members will see the results of the Gator Good campaign in addition to the top national media stories and the most engaging social media activities from the past year.

Following the communications update, Vice Presidents Elias Eldayrie and Zina Evans will provide the Annual Report on the implementation of UF new Student Information System COMPASS (<u>Campus-wide Modernization Program to Advance Student Services</u>). COMPASS will unify student services systems to benefit students as well as faculty and staff who use and need access to student-related information. Following a multi-year project timeline, COMPASS will be implemented based on the student life cycle. Other elements also will be involved in COMPASS to ensure a holistic approach.

Dr. Evans and Elias Eldayrie will share with the board an example of how the Admissions Decision release this past February improved the student experience.

#### 2.0 Call to Order and Welcome

Committee Chair, Robert G. Stern called the meeting to order at 12:42 p.m. EDT.

#### 3.0 Review and Approval of Minutes

The Committee Chair asked for a motion to approve the minutes of the December 1, 2016 committee meeting, which was made by Trustee Johnson, and a second, which was made by Trustee Powers. Committee Chair Stern asked for further discussion, after which he asked for all in favor of the motion and any opposed and the motion was approved unanimously.

#### 4.0 Action Items

The Committee did not have any Action Items.

#### 5.0 Discussion/Informational Items

#### 5.1: 2017 Legislative Session

Jane Adams, Vice President for University Relations, provided the committee with an overview of the 2017 legislative session. She discussed Senate President Joe Negron's plans to develop national destination universities, briefed the group on the budget cuts in the House and discussed several of the new House and Senate rules.

Adams spotlighted UF's 2017 legislative priorities and funding requests. They include funding in support of the Top-10 initiative, facilities maintenance, new buildings and other research programs. She referenced Senate Bill 2, the Excellence in Higher Education Act, with the World Class Faculty Program and the Professional and Graduate Degree Excellence Program. Other aspects of the bill relate to performance metrics (a four-year vs. six-year program of study), block tuition, Bright Futures and the First Generation Matching Grant Program.

Adams discussed the Gator Caucus and its meeting with UF President Kent Fuchs on March 14, as well as Gator Day on April 5 at the Capitol, with special guest, Scott Stricklin, UF's new athletics director.

Dr. Jeanna Mastrodicasa, Associate Vice President for Agriculture and Natural Resources, discussed the success of the past two legislative sessions in providing funding to hire new faculty. The number of IFAS faculty is now back to pre-recession levels and is meeting the needs of IFAS stakeholders. Mastrodicasa described the 2017 IFAS priorities, including the Water Quantity and Quality Best Management Practices Support Project as well as facility upgrades to the Tropical Research and Education Center in Homestead, the Southwest Florida Research Education Center in Immokalee and the Suwannee Valley Agricultural Center in Live Oak.

#### 5.2: The Changing Media

Assistant Vice President, UF Communications, Nicole Yucht and Assistant Vice President, UF IFAS Communications, Ruth Borger talked about how the media is evolving and what we at UF are doing to stay ahead of the trends to enhance the image, reputation and stature of this institution.

The world has gone digital and traditional media outlets are changing. Yucht said UF is using every tool and resource to disseminate information about the university. As conventional media outlets have been losing credibility and the Internet, smartphone, social media, blogging, YouTube and other tools are becoming more mainstream, we are shifting our approach to get in front of the right audiences.
